You requested the following:

Our response

- 1. The British Society of Gastroenterology Inflammatory Bowel Disease colorectal cancer surveillance endoscopy recommendations have been implemented in full in this Health Board.
- 2. Patients on our waiting lists are assessed and categorised as 'routine', 'urgent', 'urgent suspected cancer' and 'repeat planned' for waiting list management and the patient's diagnosis is not recorded centrally. To comply with your request, we would need to review every patient record which we have established would take in excess of 18 hours to undertake and therefore exceeds the appropriate costs limit under Section 12 of the Freedom of Information Act 2000, which is currently £450. This is not an exemption which requires us to consider the application of the public interest test.
- 3. The Royal Gwent Hospital (RGH) currently has 2 substantive endoscopy procedure rooms. Due to the backlog caused by the pandemic we have contracted an insourcing

team to provide additional capacity. The contract has been in place since October 2021 to help recover the backlog. We also run additional weekend lists for urgent patients.

A new endoscopy unit at RGH is currently under construction and is due to open in November 2023. This will provide 4 brand new endoscopy procedure rooms as well as the additional workforce, which is currently being reviewed with a view to extended to a 7-day working week.
