

Your Aortic Aneurysm Scan Explained

About your scan

First thing first... this type of scan is a totally painless procedure and involves no needles or other invasive devices. Similar to a baby scan, ultrasound is used to produce on screen images, which show the blood flow within your veins and arteries.

The scan may be performed by either male or female sonographer, depending on who is on duty. If you have concerns about being scanned by a person of the opposite sex please contact the department and we will discuss the booking. Tel. No: 01633 – 238287.

What to expect

For this type of scan the technologist will need to access your stomach easily. You may be asked to remove your coat / jumper etc.

You will be asked to lie down on the bed with your arms by your side.

After applying some cool gel to your stomach, the technologist will put the probe on the surface of the skin and scan the required area. You may feel some firm pressure whilst they do this.

How long will it last?

Normally this type of scan will last for between 15 – 30 minutes after which you are free to go.

How you can prepare

It is not important but can sometimes help if you do not eat a large breakfast or lunch before being scanned. It can also help if you try only to drink clear liquids. This may give the technologist a clearer image of the blood vessels in your stomach and will make your scan easier and quicker.

Please do not change your normal eating habits if you are diabetic or following a special diet for health reasons. The technologist will be able to complete the examination anyway.

After the scan

Once the scan is finished the technologist will write a report to send to your consultant telling them of the results of the examination. If the consultant wishes to see you again, they will contact you.

Patient Transport

If you arrive for your appointment by patient transport please inform the technologist so that they can notify transport when your examination has finished.
