New Hospital Sterilisation and Decontamination Unit (HSDU)

The construction of a new Hospital Sterilisation and Decontamination Unit on the site of The Grange University Hospital is well advanced and is expected to be completed in August 2021.

The new £16 million unit will provide modern facilities to clean and decontaminate operating theatre instruments used at the Grange Hospital, Ysbyty Ystrad Fawr and Nevill Hall Hospital. The

existing HSDU at Nevill Hall will close, although the unit at the Royal Gwent will remain open.

The new HSDU will provide facilities to clean



and decontaminate Endoscopy equipment and will be able to process Robotic surgery equipment in the future.

Denise Cressey, HSDU Manager, said: "This is a very exciting opportunity which will improve our efficiency. The new unit will have new equipment which has not been used in Wales before."

Llanbradach Centre for Health

We're excited to share with you that the new Llanbradach Centre for Health is close to completion!



Once the building is completed and handed over, Aber Medical Centre and The Village Surgery will need to

transfer all equipment and staff, which take about two weeks, during which time they will continue to provide services from their existing premises in Llanbradach.

Once the move is completed, all services for both practices in Llanbradach will be transferred to the new Llanbradach Centre



for Health and the existing premises in Llanbradach will no longer be used and will close.

Smoke Free Hospital and Health Board Sites

From 1 March 2021, it became illegal to smoke on any of the hospital/Health Board sites. Anyone smoking on the hospital grounds could face a £100 fine.

COVID Update

The incidence of COVID across the Health Board's area continues to fall, with all local authority areas incidence rates now below 50 per 100,000.


We have now given a total of 439,533 vaccines (a combination of 1st and 2nd doses) across our Health Board area. We have now vaccinated over 70% of those aged 40-49, and those aged 35-39 will start to receive their invitation letter in the coming weeks.



Staff Flu Vaccinations

The Health Board's flu vaccination uptake for staff at the end of the season was 66.4%, according to data provided by Occupational Health at the end of March.

Uptake increased by 5.4% in comparison to the 2019/20 season. We gave 1,094 more flu vaccinations to our staff this season compared the 2019/20 season. This is a fantastic achievement for the Health Board.



Special mention to the Family and Therapies division, who exceeded 75% uptake! And also, congratulations to Isca Medical Centre who won the 2021 Beat Flu General Practice Achievement Award for their outstanding achievement during the 2020/21 programme.

We would like to say a huge thank you and well done to all ABUHB staff who have supported the staff flu vaccination programme for the 2020/21 season – especially our flu champions, divisional flu leads, and the Occupational Health Team. We look forward to working with you next season!

Improved connectivity at The Grange University Hospital

The early opening of The Grange University Hospital last November meant that some of the technology to support communications was not quite ready.

It was recognised that the pandemic, being in a brand new hospital, and visiting restrictions could cause increased anxiety for patients. The 'GUH Patient Communication – Improvement Project' group was established to work through feedback from patients to develop an Improvement Plan.

Some of the actions already put in place already include:

- Extended Wi-Fi connection time, from 4 to 12 hours.
- Additional iPads and cordless phones have been provided to wards to support contact and facilitate virtual visiting, so patients without devices can keep in touch with loved ones.
- Full connectivity work will be supplemented by additional tools, such as a digital guidebook with step-by-step guides, a list of equipment that is on each ward, and pointers on how to get help. Help processes will be supported by Virtual Champions, the Person-Centred Care Team, and Frind i Mi volunteers.
- Plans are also progressing well to enable the full mobile telephony signal to be available across the site.

 GUH Patient Communication Improvement Project Update

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The Health Board is excited about the ambitious improvement plan and continuing implementation of this work. High on our priority list is a positive patient experience, which will be supported by making it as easy as possible for conversations to take place between families, patients and clinicians.
