# Cardiac MRI Scans Now Offered to Health Board Patients at The Grange University Hospital

Cardiac MRI Scans are deemed one of the best investigations for looking at the tissue, structure, texture, size and volume of the heart in great detail, as well as being able to detect any swelling or inflammation. However, as the Health Board were previously unable to offer this service internally, patients requiring this procedure often travelled to Bristol for their Cardiac MRI Scans, costing the Health Board hundreds of pounds to do so.



Now, the Health Board utilises existing equipment and staff members, but uses them in a different way in order to conduct in-house Cardiac MRI scans. As the heart is a moving muscle, staff must be specially trained to perform this procedure and work as part of a highly complex, highly skilled multidisciplinary team.

Cardiac MRI scans offer many benefits, including being recommended by all Associations, not involving ironising radiation, yielding fantastic information that is non-invasive, and improving diagnostic quality. The scan can also determine whether a patient has suffered a heart attack, along with diagnosing other issues with the heart, which allows patients to receive more information about their condition before their discharge.

Being able to offer this service internally offers enormous financial savings for the Health Board, as well as avoiding lengthy travel or waiting times for patients and allowing them to have this expert diagnostics closer to their home.



#### **Patient Pathway Signs**

Large monolith signs have recently been installed in the grounds of The Grange University Hospital. They are positioned on the approach road to the Hospital, on the footpath leading to the Emergency Department, and at the entrance to the Emergency Department car park. These are in addition to new vinyl graphics displayed at the entrances to the Emergency Department. The messaging asks people to stop and think if they are in the right place and highlight the fact that the Emergency Department is for life threatening illnesses and serious injuries. The signs offer information for an alternative patient pathway to the Minor Injury Units for less serious injuries, and encourage the use of the 111 service.

The new signs and graphics back up an ongoing campaign encouraging people to use the right healthcare service.

#### **C.difficile**

Over the past four years, the Health Board has risen to the serious challenge of Healthcare Associated Infection (HACI) however there is a need to alert you to a recent rise in C.difficile and remind all frontline workers of the crucial infection control interventions needed to prevent this debilitating and life threatening infection.

- Hand hygiene
- Bare Below the Elbow
- Prudent antibiotic prescribing
- Environmental Cleanliness
- Rapid Isolation
- Personal Protective Equipment
- Staff Education& Training

Your vigilance in keeping this pathogen at bay is appreciated.

#### **COVID Update**

The COVID-19 incidence rate for the Health Board area has risen to 155.5/100,000 with 2.4% of tests coming back positive compared to 177.3/100,000 and 2.6% positive for Wales as a whole. The case incidence rate for Wales is lower than the rate for England.

Uptake of the COVID-19 vaccination continues to be amongst the highest in Wales and the Gwent Test, Trace and Protect (TTP) Service continues to reach over 90% of cases and contacts.

The Aneurin Bevan Smoke-Free Environment Policy bans smoking or vaping on all hospital sites, including doorways, shelters, benches, carparks and inside cars parked in the carpark. On  $1^{\rm st}$  March a new Welsh Government law came into force. This means that smoking in one of these spaces could result in £100 fine.

Thank you to all staff for abiding by our Policy and keeping our hospital grounds clean and smoke-free places for all those who use them.
