Children's Healthcare – a reminder

When The Grange University Hospital opened on 17th November 2020), the way people access our children's hospital services across Gwent changed.

Now, all children who require emergency treatment go to The Grange University Hospital where specialist children's doctors and nurses are centralised.



All children's hospital beds and the Children's Emergency Assessment Unit are also now located at The Grange University Hospital.

The Royal Gwent Hospital, Nevill Hall Hospital and Ysbyty Ystrad Fawr continue to provide a wide range of routine outpatient appointments for children and certain elective day case surgeries.

Local **Minor Injury Units** for children (aged over 1 year) remain at The Royal Gwent Hospital, Nevill Hall Hospital, Ysbyty Ystrad Fawr and Ysbyty Aneurin Bevan.

All children aged under 1 year old need to be seen at The Grange University Hospital.

What about Maternity Services?

Antenatal clinics, midwifery-led routine deliveries and postnatal clinics will take place at The Royal Gwent Hospital, Nevill Hall Hospital and Ysbyty Ystrad Fawr.

All Consultant led births will take place at The Grange University Hospital, where there is also an additional 'alongside centre' for Midwifery-led births.

Covid-19 Vaccine Update

Since the launch of the Covid vaccine, the vaccination team have been working tirelessly on the biggest vaccination programme we've seen in our lifetime. So far across Gwent, we have vaccinated over 15,000 people.

To date, we have vaccinated all residents from 34 out of 94 care homes for older adults and all care home staff from 63 of the 94 care homes for older adults across Gwent. We have vaccinated over 3,000 over 80s and over 5,000 frontline staff.



Last week, we successfully opened our second vaccination centre at Ty Penallta in Caerphilly borough. This week, we have a supply of 9,675 doses of vaccine. We are working on plans to open two additional vaccination centres in Ebbw Vale, which will be open on Thursday and Friday and Abergavenny, which will open over the weekend. This week Ty Penallta will be open on Tuesday and Wednesday. All of our vaccination centres are appointment only and people will be contacted if they are being called for their appointment. We are also working with GP Practices who will be starting to vaccinate over 80s from next week and have already helped us on vaccinating some of our care homes residents.

We will continue to keep you updated, however due to a number of variable factors,

such as the number of doses we are allocated plans can change at short notice. We want to thank you for your continued support and together we will help keep Gwent safe.



Choose Well to Protect NHS Services

Due to the pressure on local NHS services, made worse by the Covid-19 pandemic, the Health Board is urging people across Gwent to help protect vital services for those in most need.

People can 'Choose Well' by accessing alternative services rather than the Emergency Department when their complaint is neither life-threatening nor serious. Health Boards across Wales are reporting that around 20 to 30% of patients who present at Emergency Departments could be better treated elsewhere or in a different way.

As part of the 'Protect the NHS' drive, people are being advised to order prescriptions 7 days before they're due; use their local NHS pharmacy and GP service for minor illnesses or injuries, visit the 111 / NHS Direct Wales website or call 111 for free health advice through online symptom checkers for minor ailments.



People are also reminded that if they have COVID symptoms not go to their pharmacy, GP or local Emergency Department, but instead book a test through 119 and call 111 if symptoms persist or they can no longer cope at home.
